
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1a. Looking back at the global trade architecture

Sino-US trade has been the vital element of pre-Trump 2.0 global trade

system, e.g., in 2023:





The modern network starkly contrasts with the one at the beginning of the


century, e.g., in 2000:



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
2a. The changing patterns of China's trade links

During 2025, direct Sino-US trade has dropped markedly, though China has successfully rerouted its exports to ASEAN and Europe, ... but not BRICS




2b. The changing patterns of China's trade links

For Chinese economy, since 2022, the block has become much more important as a source of resources rather than a destination market



2c. The changing patterns of China's trade links


A simple reason is low average per capita income of BRICS countries, while China seeks to establish its leadership in sophisticated products



2d. The changing patterns of China's trade links


China has managed to diversify its bundle of source and destination countries, though intra-BRICS concentration has increased markedly

Normalized Theil index: trade concentration



3a. Is China captured by the new tariffs?

No effect has been pronounced during the first three quarters, though in Oct China's exports has dropped – early signs of Trump's "new deals"...




3b. Is China captured by the new tariffs?

... or simply a calendar effect issue? The evidence is inconsistent, so it's quite hard to form a judgement until Nov data is released



4. And just in case, a reminder: today is not tomorrow

USA is still the main destination \rightarrow today trade rerouting is more attractive $\rightarrow \bigwedge$ in the long-term China may focus on large & fast-growing markets*
